Pastor's Message

Greetings Friends in Christ!

Trivia time: What song holds the distinction in the United States of being the Number 1 hit with the oldest lyrics?

Hint: It's words are traditionally ascribed to King Solomon sometime between the 10th to 3rd centuries BC

If you answered the Byrds' 1965 recording of the song written by Pete Seeger in 1959 called "Turn! Turn! Turn!," also known as, or subtitled, "To Everything There Is a Season," you're

absolutely correct! The lyrics \sim except for the title, repeated throughout the song, and the final two lines \sim consist of the first eight verses of Ecclesiastes, chapter 3 in the Old Testament of the Bible. Ecclesiastes 3, is sung, or read:

¹For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven:

²a time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to pluck up what is planted; ³a time to kill, and a time to heal; a time to break down, and a time to build up;

⁴a time to weep, and a time to laugh; a time to mourn, and a time to dance;

⁵a time to throw away stones, and a time to gather stones together; a time to embrace, and a time to refrain from embracing;

⁶a time to seek, and a time to lose; a time to keep, and a time to throw away;

⁷a time to tear, and a time to sew; a time to keep silence, and a time to speak;

⁸a time to love, and a time to hate; a time for war, and a time for peace.

As verse 11a & 12 go on to tell us, "God has made everything suitable for its time ... I know

that there is nothing better for them than to be happy and enjoy themselves as long as they live."

"To everything there is a season ..." sounds a lot like "Transitions" to me.

Stewardship

Consider 'Percentage Giving'

"Bring the full tithe into the storehouse, so that there may be food in my house, and thus put me to the test, says the Lord of hosts; see if I will not open the windows of heaven for you and pour down for you an overflowing blessing." –Malachi 3:10

Again and again the Bible lifts up tithing – giving a tenth of our income – as a benchmark for faithful giving. The prophet Malachi goes so far as to say God promises to rain down abundant blessings upon those who tithe. Yet most Christians fall quite short of tithing, generally giving less than 3 percent to the church?

Why? One reason is that in calculating how much to give, most people use the fixed-rate method. They first take stock of how much they *are able* to give, and then how much they want to give. Weighing these two factors, they then decide how much *they will* give.

There's nothing particularly bad about this method, but it has limitations. While giving folks an offering amount they can live with, the fixed-rate method doesn't necessarily put them on the path toward tithing.

A better method is percentage giving, that is, determining your offering as a percentage of income. Here's how:

Using a calculator, divide your weekly (or monthly, or yearly) church offering by your takehome pay for the same period (week, month or year). Then multiply that figure by 100. This gives you the percentage of your giving. For example, if your weekly offering is \$30 and your weekly take-home pay is \$500, your percentage of giving is 6 percent $(30 \div 500 = 0.06$, then $0.06 \times 100 = 6$).

Can *everyone* afford to tithe? Of course not. But many of us, maybe most of us, could afford to give more than we do now. The important thing is to be prayerful about your offering, be as generous as you are able, and keep tithing in mind, perhaps as a goal.

Keeping track of your giving as a percentage of income provides you with information to gauge your offering and perhaps build up to a tithe. You can make it a goal gradually, over time, to increase the percentage until you reach a tithe – 10 percent. One simple way would be to increase your giving by one half of a percentage point per year.

As Malachi promises, God will bless you richly for your tithing, and not only that, your church will be blessed, too. Switching from fixed-rate giving to percentage giving is a good start.

Faith In Action News

FIA Inspires trip to Montgomery, AL

Faith in Action has opened my eyes to the possibility of many new adventures. Most recently by defining my vacation plans as part of a trip to Charleston, SC, for a family reunion! Our FIA studies on racial justice led to an additional goal along with reuniting with family: to "get to Montgomery for the Legacy Museum and the National Memorial for Peace and Justice." Both are projects of the Equal Justice Initiative (EJI) and Bryan Stevenson, author of Equal Mercy and part of The Sun Still Shines (2 FIA Pic books). As my vacation plans developed it seemed I could add other stops on this trip: Brunswick, GA and Penn Center, St. Helena Island, SC, (from another FIA book Wandering in a Strange Land). What a difference it made to be on a "eduvation"! (I made up that word!)

Unfortunately, the Museum does not allow photographs inside, so I'll use their words to describe its location and exhibits. My two hours here are best described as overwhelming and gut-wrenching.



"The Legacy Museum provides a comprehensive history of the United States focused on slavery and its legacy. From the Transatlantic Slave Trade and its impact on the North and coastal communities across America through the Domestic Slave Trade (what???) and Reconstruction, the museum provides detailed interactive content and compelling narratives. Lynching, codified racial segregation, and the emergence of



over-incarceration in the 20th century are examined in depth and brought to life through film, images, and first-person narratives.

Situated on a site where enslaved Black people were forced to labor in bondage, the location's history adds to the contemplative and sobering atmosphere.

An entire wing of the museum explores the economics of enslavement, the violence of slavery, sexual violence against enslaved Black women, the commodification of people, and the desperate efforts enslaved people made to stay connected to loved ones.

An expansive exhibit on Reconstruction (after 1864) documents the important 12-year period in American history with a detailed timeline, short films, and first-person narrative accounts.

The museum's expansive content on lynching is housed in a wing that examines the role of media during the era of racial terror violence. The last words of lynching victims dramatize the suffering racial terrorism imposed on entire communities. Facts about the lynching of children help visitors understand the scale of terror and violence many families endured."

One of the more sobering exhibits in the Museum contains 800 jars of soil collected around the country. They line the wall, one

right after the other, rows upon rows, all marked with tape and perhaps a name. This is part of EJI's (Equal Justice Initiative) Community Remembrance Project is a unique and powerful display of the growing community response to reckoning with this painful past. Most jars are labeled "UNKNOWN."



The National Memorial for Peace and Justice (located a couple of blocks from the Museum, shuttles are provided) was "conceived with the hope of creating a sober, meaningful site where people can gather and reflect on America's history of racial inequality." It is all that and more! (Plus, photos are allowed!)




Upon entering the memorial, I first encountered the sculpture on slavery. The path then leads visitors on a journey from slavery, through lynching and racial terror, with text, narrative, and monuments to the lynching victims in America. In the center of the site, is memorial square. The memorial experience continues through the civil rights era made visible with a



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sculpture by Dana King dedicated to the women who sustained the Montgomery Bus Boycott. Finally, the memorial journey ends with contemporary issues of police violence and racially biased criminal justice.



The memorial structure on the center of the site consists of over 800 corten steel monuments, one for each county in the United States where a racial terror lynching took place. (All documented by EJI)

The building is four immense hallways, the monuments are installed in all four sides, each engraved with the name of a county and state and the names of the victims lynched in that place. Most of the columns hang from the ceiling, creating a symbolic lynching. (You walk, looking up.) While most of the counties are located in states of the south, not all are. In fact, Colorado is listed on one of the columns with several other states.

The museum and memorial are part of EJI's work to advance truth and reconciliation around race in America and to more honestly confront the legacy of slavery, lynching, and segregation. "Our nation's history of racial injustice casts a shadow across the American landscape," EJI Director Bryan Stevenson explains. "This shadow cannot be lifted until we shine the light of truth on the destructive violence that shaped our nation, traumatized people of color, and compromised our commitment to the rule of law and to equal justice."

One of his statements resonates with me both then and today: "The formal abolition of slavery did nothing to overcome the harmful ideas created to defend it, and so slavery did not end: it evolved."

This is vital US history that was not addressed in my school classes, elementary through college. I believe it is a history that all Americans should know. What is it that stops us from doing so? Add this Museum and Memorial to your next trip south and begin the history lesson. (Suzanne Rousso)

Tour of Denver Water Treatment/ Recycling Plant & the "Ick Factor" (Additions 8/22/23)

Two ladies from Faith in Action were able to tour the Denver Water
Treatment/Recycling Plant at 5650 York
Street in Commerce City, even though the site when Googling states, "temporarily closed". It was a little tricky to locate, but using Brighton Blvd. off I-70, not York
Street, got us there. A waiver needs to be signed before one can go on the tour, which begins inside a building, and exits to the outside area of the plant. We needed to wear the safety glasses that were temporarily provided to us to tour some areas.

"Denver Water's recycled water system serves numerous parks, schools, golf courses" including The Denver Zoo and Xcel Energy. Recycled water is non potable (potable is safe to be used as drinking water) and is currently not available for residential use. Denver has a high-quality water source, which is the mountains. The process begins: "treated water from Metro Wastewater is captured just before it is discharged into the South Platte River & is pumped to Denver Water's Recycling Plant." There are many other steps before "the recycled water is stored in a 300-foot wide, 23-foot-deep reservoir which can hold 11 million gallons of water." This is the Finished Water Reservoir.

This was an interesting tour for those that are interested in water, drought, and recycling of water issues. And what is the "Ick Factor"? It is when one does not want to drink treated water. There are places around the country where treated water is potable and customer education is important. Where did you say that water came from?

FAITH IN ACTION PICKS... BOOKS:

The Planet You Inherit: Letters to My

Grandchildren when Uncertainty's a Sure Thing, Larry Rasmussen, 2020, In this series of letters to his grandchildren, Rasmussen describes what our children's



and grandchildren's generation will face: a different world, one affected by climate instability, mass uncertainty, and breathtaking extinction. In fact, the next generation will face the reality that human activity is changing the planet from one geological epoch to another.

As a grandfather invested in a green earth and climate justice as well as a scholar of faith-based earth ethics, Rasmussen bridges this gap between generations to write to the future about climate change, global citizenship, democracy, and legacy. Rasmussen explores the large questions of justice, meaning, and faith, encouraging us to speak to and look to the future generation and their future world. It is a book of extraordinary hope in a time of extraordinary urgency. (Suzanne Rousso)

MOVIES:

"Till is a profoundly emotional and cinematic film about the true story of Mamie Till Mobley's relentless pursuit of justice for her 14 year old son, Emmett Till, who in 1955 was lynched while visiting his cousins in Mississippi. In Mamie's poignant journey of grief turned to action we see the universal power of a mother's ability of change the world. (United Artists; Barbara Kaare-Lopez).

Jane Goodall's Reasons for Hope,

DMNS, Infinity Theater (former IMAX), thru September A giant screen film that is based on Jane's philosophy of hope for the world and all of life on it. The film is structured around Jane's four main pillars of hope: the amazing




human intellect, the resilience of nature, the power and dedication of young people, and the indomitable human spirit. The main purpose of the film is to highlight good-news stories and to inspire people to make a difference in the world around them. Terrific cinematography, compelling stories, deeply inspiring, a joy to watch. (Recommended by Suzanne Rousso)

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David Attenborough: A Life On Our Planet

(Netflix) In this unique feature documentary, the celebrated naturalist reflects upon both the defining moments of his lifetime and the devastating changes he



has seen. The film addresses some of the biggest challenges facing life on our planet, providing a snapshot of global nature loss in a single lifetime. With it comes a powerful message of hope for future generations as Attenborough reveals the solutions to help save our planet from disaster.

The Ants & the Grasshopper (Coming To A Theater Near You, September) Anita

Chitaya has a gift; she can help bring abundant food from dead soil, she can make men fight for



gender equality, and she can end child hunger in her village. Now, to save her home from extreme weather, she faces her greatest challenge: persuading Americans that climate change is real. Traveling from Malawi to California to the White House, she meets climate skeptics and despairing farmers. Her journey takes her across all the divisions shaping the US, from the rural-urban divide, to schisms of race, class and gender, to the thinking that allows Americans to believe we live on a different planet from everyone else. It will take all her skill and experience to persuade us that we're all in this together.

The Letter (YouTube, Prime Video, PBS) In 2015, Pope Francis wrote Laudato Si' (The Letter); an encyclical letter about the environmental crisis to every single person in the world. A few years



later, four voices that have gone unheard in global conversations have been invited to an unprecedented dialogue with the Pope. Hailing from Senegal, the Amazon, India, and Hawai'i, they bring perspective and solutions from the poor, the indigenous, the youth, and wildlife into a conversation with Pope Francis himself. This documentary follows their journey to Rome and the extraordinary experiences that took place there, and is packed with powerfully moving personal stories alongside the latest information about the planetary crisis and the toll it's taking on nature and people. 
Faith In Action has reserved a group tour of their Recycling Plant (Water, not Waste!) for **September 14th at 9:30am.** There is

Introducing... Technology Ministry Team!!!



Do you know that in Martin Luther's time the most highly regarded technological advancement was the PRINTING PRESS?!?!? Johannes Gutenberg is credited with its invention in 1436. Martin Luther's 95 Theses, which previously would have circulated only among the literate scholars of Wittenberg, became a bestselling pamphlet within a year of its initial posting in 1517.

The Printing Press and Martin Luther's translations of the Bible to German made the Bible more accessible to even more people of that era.

The typewriter was later invented in 1868 and soon after in 1885, the mimeograph machine was invented. The mimeograph machine was a low-cost duplicating machine that worked by forcing ink through a stencil on to paper. Many of you may still remember the smell of the ink of the mimeograph machine. The smell of fresh mimeographed paper is indescribable. I know my teachers used it in the elementary and middle school I attended. I know our very own church office staff used typewriters and the mimeograph machine up to the mid-90's!! Just ask Eileen Koppenhaver!! 🙂

ENTER the Copy Machine and Personal Computers (PCs)... In the Mid-90's, our church began to use a computer using

and a 'used' XEFOX copy machine. The Internet was still slow and dial-up. E-mail was thought to be a fad. Times were so much simpler then. <sigh>


